The Audio: Rating the Sound

I'm thinking back on all the Blu-rays I've ever watched and I don't think any have ever started with a note from the filmmakers saying for the best audio experience that they recommend listening to the movie "loud." It makes perfect sense. You won't feel the full weight of this much nuanced soundtrack by just allowing it to play at your normal volume level. Crank this baby up and let its incredibly complex sound design wash over you.

Fox has provided a DTS-HD Master Audio 7.1 mix for this release. Believe me when I say this, you're going to want all eight of those channels to be able to get the full effect of this film. From the opening scene you can distinctly hear waves crashing. Full-bodied waves that fill the whole front part of the soundfield. The smooth crashing of the waves seamlessly ebbs and flows through the channels creating a very realistic experience.

The soundtrack is full of memorable classical pieces from Brahms to Mozart, which reverberate through all seven speakers. This music is meant to envelope you in the scenes and it most certainly does. It sucks you in as the symphonic sounds are clearly defined with wonderful fidelity.

Directionality is key as every scene is almost like we're right in the middle of it. We hear people talking off to the side in the side speakers, while other kids chatter up front about something completely different. A town waterhole is filled to the brim with townsfolk milling about and their children frolicking in the water. Each individual voice is distinct and intelligible, even when all the kids in the group are talking simultaneously like they so often do.

The subwoofer also isn't left out at all. The celestial scenes are packed with ominous LFE. As a small planet passes by what appears to be a giant fireball it's easy to feel the surging bass being produced. When volcanoes erupt, the sudden force was enough to terrifyingly jar my sleeping dog awake, causing her to move further away from the television.

Dialogue is always intelligible, even the whispers -- of which there are many. This is one of the reasons you need that volume turned up loud. There are so many hushed lines of dialogue that you'll miss something if it isn't cranked up a bit. What is very telling to me about this mix is that there are a few times where a sound or two are thrown in without any warning. At the beginning after the O'Brien's find out that their son has died in the war, the camera pans through a forest gazing at the treetops and you can hear Mrs. O'Brien scream. It's a muted scream, but it's delicate touch isn't lost in the slightest.

Just like the video, the audio here is breathtakingly amazing. Demo material all the way around.

Audio Quality on this release is presented in both DTS-HD 7.1 Master Audio and Dolby Digital 4.0 Surround.

This film's treasured status and iconic nature certainly merit an outstanding audio mix that presents this musical film in a worthy fashion. Recent musical films released to Blu-ray from FOX had a little trouble in this department, and it is more than pleasing to be able to report here that this release is absolutely free of any issues when it comes to its DTS-HD 7.1 Master Audio mix.

The use of the discrete rear channels is impressive, not lying totally under the radar as is the case with the presentation of some 7.1 mixes. The opening sequence of the film predominantly serves as a great exhibit of the discrete rear channels conveying sound effects, as the gusting winds pan about the soundscape. Also, the thunderstorm that takes place before the musical sequence of "My Favorite Things" offers a bit of thunder that pops-up and passes about the 7.1 setup, and the chanting prayers of the nuns inside of the abbey provide

an acoustically-appropriate subtle reverb that is present in multiple channels, and bares a panning element, too. Otherwise, you will hear mostly just the music bring life to these discrete rear channels.

Obviously the musical numbers are a large part of what makes this film what it is, and they are presented flawlessly within this audio track. As the music builds-up to into its strong performance in the opening sequence, the dominance of brass is presented bright and clean, and as the opening credits succeed this, the montage of the film's musical numbers proceeds to convey the pristine orchestra style music's great dynamic range. The music itself is also a key element of what provides decent subwoofer usage; obviously this does not make for an aggressive rumble, but it is smooth and noticeable.

Dialogue has no issues within the 7.1 mix, always remaining clear and audible above the music. As mentioned in the opening paragraph, the vocals within the musical numbers are presented perfectly, and never suffer from having a subdued performance amongst the music itself. Overall, there are by far no complaints to be held with the 7.1 mix on this release, as it is well deserving of a "5 Star Rating".

"The Sound of Music", now in its 45th anniversary, and also its debut to Blu-ray Disc, is simply the sort of cinematic cultural staple that each generation passes on to the next. The musical sequences of the film are its fuel to the fire, and equally as much as the story itself, have left tags within pop-culture even today. It really is a movie that speaks volumes to many ages, and it's terrific to finally see the film make it to the Blu-ray format, as it goes without saying how significantly the essence of the film deserves the best presentation available.
